LIBRARIANS USING THE INTERNET ON THE JOB: A CURRENT RESEARCH PROJECT

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Information obtained from the Internet: Discussion lists (other people), and Internet accessible full-text, bibliographic and factual databases on the World Wide Web and other Internet distribution mechanisms, is being used by librarians in performing.

Research Project Background

This research project idea follows on two other attempts to gather specific information about Internet use by librarians: Karen Schneider's Internet Reference Success Stories Collection - http://www.intac.com/~kgs/success/successcover.html and an earlier study of librarian's use of discussion lists for professional information (Kovacs, Robinson & Dixon, 1995).

Internet Reference Success Stories consist of numerous examples of librarians using the Internet to answer everyday and not-so-everyday reference questions using e-mail, gopher, ftp, telnet and Web resources on the Internet. These were collected by the Kovacs, Robinson & Dixon project was a qualitative exploration of how e-conferences in the Library and Information Science field are fulfilling information needs and whether they are also replacing or enhancing traditional information sources.

Research Project Overview

The "Survey: How are librarians using the Internet on the job" is intended to explore the uses of the Internet by librarians beyond the library related discussion groups. The survey includes questions on the following topics:

- · How long have they been using the Internet?
- Do they use the Internet on the Job?
- How often do they use the Internet on they job?
- Which Internet tools do they Use? Discussion Lists, World Wide Web, Telnet, Gopher?

- Which Web browser they use if any (Netscape, Internet Explorer, Mosaic, LYNX, etc.)?
- Which Web search engines they prefer to use?
- What kind of computer and operating system they use on the job?
- What specific activities have they used the Internet for on the job (reference questions, news about librarianship, professional development, inter-personal networking, collection development, etc)?
- Demographic questions about their job titles and descriptions, what type of library they work in, where they went to library school and when they graduated, what country or state are they located in?
- What kind of Internet training they've had if any?
- Their opinion of censorship on the Internet?

Most questions on the survey offer the opportunity for the respondents to clarify with real examples what they are doing with the Internet on the job.

Research Project Methodology

The survey was announced in Mid-January 1997 on a core group of library related discussion groups listed in the table below.
